



## CSFC Bills for Review March 2019

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### Facilities Related Bills (Hot Bills)

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- AB 48 (O'Donnell D) Kindergarten-Community Colleges Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2020 and 2022.  
Introduced: 12/3/2018 Last Amend: 1/28/2019  
Status: 1/29/2019-Re-referred to Com. on ED.  
Location: 1/24/2019-A. ED.  
Calendar: 4/10/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY EDUCATION, O'DONNELL, Chair  
Summary: Would set forth the Kindergarten-Community Colleges Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2020 and 2022 as state general obligation bond acts that would provide unspecified amounts of funds to construct and modernize education facilities, as specified. These respective bond acts would become operative only if approved by the voters at unspecified 2020 and 2022 statewide elections. The bill would also provide for the submission of the bond acts to the voters at those elections.
- AB 197 (Weber D) Full-day kindergarten.  
Introduced: 1/10/2019 Last Amend: 3/20/2019  
Status: 3/21/2019-Re-referred to Com. on APPR.  
Location: 3/20/2019-A. APPR.  
Summary: Would require, commencing with the 2022–23 school year, schools in school districts offering kindergarten and charter schools serving pupils in early primary grades to implement a full-day kindergarten program, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. The bill would provide that a minimum schoolday for full-day kindergarten is the same number of minutes per schoolday that is offered to pupils in 1st grade.
- AB 456 (Chiu D) Public contracts: claim resolution.  
Introduced: 2/11/2019  
Status: 2/21/2019-Referred to Com. on A. & A.R.  
Location: 2/21/2019-A. A. & A.R.  
Calendar: 3/27/2019 9 a.m. - State Capitol, Room 437 ASSEMBLY ACCOUNTABILITY AND ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW, PETRIE-NORRIS, Chair  
Summary: Current law prescribes various requirements regarding the formation, content, and enforcement of state and local public contracts. Current law establishes, until January 1, 2020, for contracts entered into on or after January 1, 2017, a claim resolution process applicable to any claim by a contractor in connection with a public works project against a public entity, as defined. Current law defines a claim for these purposes as a separate demand by the contractor for one or more of the following: a time extension for relief from damages or penalties for delay, payment of money or damages arising from work done pursuant to the contract for a public work, or payment of an amount disputed by the public entity, as specified. This bill would remove the January 1, 2020, repeal date on these provisions, thereby making this claim resolution process operative indefinitely.
- AB 468 (Muratsuchi D) Pesticides: schoolsites: organic landscape management practices.  
Introduced: 2/11/2019 Last Amend: 3/18/2019  
Status: 3/19/2019-Re-referred to Com. on ED.  
Location: 2/21/2019-A. ED.  
Calendar: 3/27/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY EDUCATION, O'DONNELL, Chair  
Summary: Would prohibit lawn care pesticides from being used on the outdoor spaces or playgrounds of schoolsites unless an emergency pesticide application is necessary due to an imminent threat to public health. The bill would require the Department of Pesticide Regulation to establish organic landscape management practices for schoolsites and, on a quarterly basis, seek the advice and counsel of experts and scientists in the fields of turf and landscape management, maintenance of trees and shrubs, organic pest management, and integrated pest management protocols on fulfilling the requirements of these provisions.

- AB 1028 (Gonzalez D) Clean Energy Job Creation Program.  
Introduced: 2/21/2019  
Status: 3/14/2019-Referred to Coms. on U. & E. and L. & E.  
Location: 3/14/2019-A. U. & E.  
Calendar: 4/3/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 437 ASSEMBLY UTILITIES AND ENERGY, HOLDEN, Chair  
Summary: Would require the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission, in allocating grants to local educational agencies as part of the program, to also give priority based on a local educational agency's utilization of apprentices from state-approved apprenticeship and preapprenticeship programs, as specified. The bill would explicitly authorize program expenditures associated with employee training and energy managers. The bill would transfer \$300,000,000 dollars from the General Fund to the Clean Energy Job Creation Fund and would, for the 2019–20 fiscal year, appropriate that money to the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission for the purpose of the program.
- AB 1761 (Jones-Sawyer D) Public schools: accountability: county superintendents of schools.  
Introduced: 2/22/2019  
Status: 3/18/2019-Referred to Com. on ED.  
Location: 3/18/2019-A. ED.  
Summary: Would recast and revise the duties of the county superintendent. The bill would require the county superintendent to identify a list of schools based on the schools identified for support and assistance under the state's multiple measures public school accountability system and the single system of support established under a specified statute, and submit a report as to the state of those schools. The bill would require the county superintendent, as part of compliance with accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, to review those identified schools at least annually as priority schools.
- SB 297 (Pan D) School facilities: approval of plans.  
Introduced: 2/14/2019  
Status: 3/7/2019-Set for hearing March 27.  
Location: 2/28/2019-S. ED.  
Calendar: 3/27/2019 9 a.m. - John L. Burton Hearing Room (4203) SENATE EDUCATION, LEYVA, Chair  
Summary: Current law under the Field Act requires the governing board of each school district, community college district, or other school authority before adopting any plans for a school building to submit the plans to the department for approval. For purposes of those provisions, this bill would require the submission of the plans to the department before the commencement of any construction or alteration of any school building instead of before adopting the plans.

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- AB 8 (Chu D) Pupil health: mental health professionals.  
Introduced: 12/3/2018  
Last Amend: 3/19/2019  
Status: 3/20/2019-Re-referred to Com. on HEALTH.  
Location: 3/13/2019-A. HEALTH  
Calendar: 4/2/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY HEALTH, WOOD, Chair  
Summary: Would require, on or before December 31, 2022, a school of a school district or county office of education and a charter school to have at least one mental health professional, as defined, for every 400 pupils generally accessible to pupils on campus during school hours. The bill would require, on or before December 31, 2022, a school of a school district or county office of education and a charter school with fewer than 400 pupils to have at least one mental health professional generally accessible to pupils on campus during school hours, to employ at least one mental health professional to serve multiple schools, or to enter into a memorandum of understanding with a county agency or community-based organization for at least one mental health professional employed by the agency or organization to provide services to pupils.

- AB 38 (Wood D) Fire safety: State Wildfire Preparedness Board: Fire Hardened Homes Revolving Loan Fund.  
 Introduced: 12/3/2018  
 Last Amend: 3/21/2019  
 Status: 3/25/2019-Re-referred to Com. on G.O.  
 Location: 1/24/2019-A. G.O.  
 Calendar: 4/3/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION, GRAY, Chair  
 Summary: Current law, the California Building Standards Law, requires the State Fire Marshal to develop, and the California Building Standards Commission to review, building standards to implement the state's fire and life safety policy. This bill would, on or after July 1, 2025, require a seller of a building in a very high fire hazard severity zone to provide to the buyer a certificate certifying that the low-cost retrofits developed by the State Fire Marshal have been undertaken on the building.
- AB 123 (McCarty D) Early childhood education: state preschool program: transitional kindergarten: access: standards.  
 Introduced: 12/3/2018  
 Last Amend: 3/26/2019  
 Status: 3/26/2019-From committee chair, with author's amendments: Amend, and re-refer to Com. on ED. Read second time and amended.  
 Location: 3/25/2019-A. ED.  
 Summary: Would, commencing with the 2020–21 fiscal year, and notwithstanding any other law, authorize a provider operating a state preschool program within the attendance boundary of a public school, except as provided, where at least 70% of enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, to enroll 4-year-old children meeting specified priorities. The bill would authorize any remaining slots to be open for enrollment to any other families otherwise not eligible, as provided. The bill would prohibit a state preschool classroom from exceeding 24 children.
- AB 124 (McCarty D) Preschool Facilities Bond Act of 2020.  
 Introduced: 12/3/2018  
 Status: 1/24/2019-Referred to Com. on ED.  
 Location: 1/24/2019-A. ED.  
 Summary: Would enact the Preschool Facilities Bond Act of 2020 which, if approved by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$500,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance a preschool facility grant program.
- AB 209 (Limón D) Parks: environmental education: grant program.  
 Introduced: 1/14/2019  
 Status: 3/20/2019-In committee: Set, first hearing. Referred to suspense file.  
 Location: 3/12/2019-A. APPR.  
 Summary: Would require the Director of Parks and Recreation to establish the Outdoor Equity Grants Program, to increase the ability of underserved and at-risk populations to participate in outdoor environmental educational experiences at state parks and other public lands where outdoor environmental education programs take place. The bill would require the director to, among other things, give priority for funding to outdoor environmental education programs that primarily provide outreach to and serve students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, foster youth, or pupils of limited English proficiency, as provided.
- AB 236 (Garcia, Eduardo D) Special education programs: Family Empowerment Centers on Disability.  
 Introduced: 1/18/2019  
 Last Amend: 3/20/2019  
 Status: 3/21/2019-Re-referred to Com. on APPR.  
 Location: 3/20/2019-A. APPR.  
 Summary: Would revise and recast provisions related to Family Empowerment Centers on Disability, including requiring the State Department of Education to give priority to grant applicants in those of the 32 regions in the state that do not have a center, increasing the minimum base rate for each center awarded a

grant from \$150,000 to \$237,000 commencing with the start of the fiscal year after a center has been established in each of the 32 regions, and, commencing with the 2022–23 fiscal year, providing for an annual cost-of-living adjustment of the grant amount, as specified. The bill would also increase the base amount to be made available annually to the council from \$150,000 to \$237,000.

- AB 291 (Chu D) Emergency preparedness.  
Introduced: 1/28/2019  
Last Amend: 3/25/2019  
Status: 3/26/2019-Re-referred to Com. on G.O.  
Location: 3/25/2019-A. G.O.  
Summary: Would establish a Local Emergency Preparedness and Hazard Mitigation Fund to support staffing, planning, and other emergency mitigation priorities to help local governments meet emergency management, preparedness, readiness, and resilience goals. The bill would require the Office of Emergency Services to distribute funds to lead agencies, as defined, throughout the state. The bill would require lead agencies to further distribute those funds to local governments pursuant to a specified schedule for specified purposes, and impose various requirements on local governments that receive funds pursuant to these provisions.
- AB 360 (Voepel R) School meals.  
Introduced: 2/4/2019  
Status: 2/5/2019-From printer. May be heard in committee March 7.  
Location: 2/4/2019-A. PRINT  
Summary: Current law requires each school district or county superintendent of schools maintaining kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, to provide for each needy pupil one nutritionally adequate free or reduced-price meal during each schoolday, as specified, and authorizes a school district or county office of education to use funds available through any federal or state program for those purposes, as specified. Current law also authorizes school district funds to be used for the purchase of those school meals for pupils. This bill would make nonsubstantive changes to the provision authorizing school district funds to be used for that purpose.
- AB 393 (Nazarian D) Building codes: earthquake safety: functional recovery standard.  
Introduced: 2/6/2019  
Last Amend: 3/21/2019  
Status: 3/25/2019-Re-referred to Com. on H. & C.D.  
Location: 3/21/2019-A. H. & C.D.  
Summary: Would require the California Building Standards Commission, by June 30, 2020, to assemble a functional recovery working group comprised of certain state entities and members of the construction and insurance industries, as specified. The bill would require the working group, by June 30, 2021, to consider whether a "functional recovery" standard is warranted for all or some building occupancy classifications, using specified criteria, and to investigate the practical means of implementing that standard, as specified. The bill would require the working group to advise the appropriate state agencies to propose the building standards, as specified.
- AB 428 (Medina D) Special education funding.  
Introduced: 2/7/2019  
Status: 3/13/2019-Coauthors revised. From committee: Do pass and re-refer to Com. on APPR. (Ayes 6. Noes 0.) (March 13). Re-referred to Com. on APPR.  
Location: 3/13/2019-A. APPR.  
Summary: Current law requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to determine the amount of funding to be provided for each special education local plan area in accordance with specified calculations. Current law requires the Superintendent, for the 2013–14 fiscal year, to compute an equalization adjustment for each special education local plan area for purposes of increasing the funding rates for special education local plan areas with funding rates below the 90th percentile, as specified. This bill would increase that percentile to the 95th percentile and would require the Superintendent to compute that equalization adjustment commencing with the first fiscal year after funds are apportioned pursuant to a specified formula and for each fiscal year thereafter in which an equalization appropriation is made, as specified.

- AB 429 (Nazarian D) Seismically vulnerable buildings: inventory.  
 Introduced: 2/7/2019  
 Last Amend: 3/20/2019  
 Status: 3/21/2019-Re-referred to Com. on G.O.  
 Location: 3/18/2019-A. G.O.  
 Calendar: 4/3/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION, GRAY, Chair  
 Summary: Current law establishes a program within all cities and all counties and portions thereof located within seismic zone 4, as defined, to identify all potentially hazardous buildings and to establish a mitigation program for these buildings. This bill would require the Alfred E. Alquist Seismic Safety Commission, by specified deadlines, to identify funding and develop a bidding process for hiring a third-party contractor to create an inventory of potentially vulnerable buildings, as defined. The bill would require the third-party contractor, in conjunction with the commission, by July 1, 2022, to develop a statewide inventory of potentially seismically vulnerable buildings in 29 specified counties in California using information developed by local jurisdictions pursuant to the above-described provisions.
- AB 483 (Mayes R) Fire insurance.  
 Introduced: 2/12/2019  
 Status: 2/13/2019-From printer. May be heard in committee March 15.  
 Location: 2/12/2019-A. PRINT  
 Summary: Current law generally regulates classes of insurance, including fire insurance. Current law prescribes the standard form for this issuance of fire insurance policies covering property. Current law requires that all fire insurance policies in California be on the standard form, with no additions to or omissions from that form, except as provided. This bill would make technical, nonsubstantive changes to that provision.
- AB 605 (Maienschein D) Special education: assistive technology devices.  
 Introduced: 2/14/2019  
 Status: 2/25/2019-Referred to Com. on ED.  
 Location: 2/25/2019-A. ED.  
 Calendar: 3/27/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY EDUCATION, O'DONNELL, Chair  
 Summary: Would require a local educational agency to provide an individual with exceptional needs who requires the use of an assistive technology device with continuous access to that device while the individual is enrolled in that local educational agency. The bill would also require a local educational agency to be responsible for providing an individual with exceptional needs who requires the use of an assistive technology device with continued access to that device, or to a comparable device when that individual, due to graduation or enrollment in another local educational agency, ceases to be enrolled in that local educational agency.
- AB 996 (Bigelow R) Special education: pilot program.  
 Introduced: 2/21/2019  
 Status: 3/7/2019-Referred to Com. on ED.  
 Location: 3/7/2019-A. ED.  
 Calendar: 4/10/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY EDUCATION, O'DONNELL, Chair  
 Summary: Would, until January 1, 2023, would establish a pilot program to be administered by the county offices of education in the Counties of El Dorado, Monterey, Sacramento, San Diego, and Sonoma to improve the social and behavioral skills of pupils who are autistic or have other special needs, as specified. The bill would require those county offices of education and school districts to submit a specified report to the Assembly Budget Subcommittee 2 on Education Finance no later than January 1, 2022.
- AB 1157 (Burke D) Time Deposit Program: report.  
 Introduced: 2/21/2019 Last Amend: 3/25/2019  
 Status: 3/26/2019-Re-referred to Com. on B. & F.  
 Location: 3/25/2019-A. B. & F.  
 Summary: Would, on or before January 1, 2022, and on or before January 1 each year thereafter, require the Treasurer to submit a report to the Legislature on the Time Deposit Program, as provided.

- AB 1196 (Gipson D) Community schools: California Community Schools Act.  
 Introduced: 2/21/2019  
 Last Amend: 3/26/2019  
 Status: 3/26/2019-From committee chair, with author's amendments: Amend, and re-refer to Com. on ED.  
 Read second time and amended.  
 Location: 3/25/2019-A. ED.  
 Summary: Would establish the California Community Schools Act, which would require the State Department of Education to make grants available to qualified schools to plan and operate community schools. The bill would require the department to establish an Office of Community Schools to oversee the community schools program. The bill would require the department to provide technical assistance to planning grant recipients and would allocate an unspecified amount to the department for that purpose, subject to appropriation of those funds by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act or another statute.
- AB 1290 (Gloria D) The California Housing Finance Agency.  
 Introduced: 2/21/2019  
 Last Amend: 3/19/2019  
 Status: 3/20/2019-Re-referred to Com. on H. & C.D.  
 Location: 3/18/2019-A. H. & C.D.  
 Calendar: 4/24/2019 9:30 a.m. - State Capitol, Room 126 ASSEMBLY HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, CHIU, Chair  
 Summary: Would require the California Housing Finance Agency to collaborate with the Strategic Growth Council, the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the Treasurer's office in order to determine a consolidated process for various affordable housing projects to apply for bond money, tax credits, and Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities grants and loans.
- AB 1736 (Daly D) Local agency public construction.  
 Introduced: 2/22/2019  
 Status: 2/25/2019-Read first time.  
 Location: 2/22/2019-A. PRINT  
 Summary: Current law, the Local Agency Public Construction Act, authorizes a public entity subject to that act to require each prospective bidder for a public contract to complete and submit to the entity a standardized questionnaire and financial statement. Current law prohibits the standardized questionnaire from requiring prospective bidders to disclose specified violations if those violations were based on a subcontractor's failure to comply with specified provisions and the bidder had no knowledge of the subcontractor's violations. This bill would make nonsubstantive changes to those provisions.
- AB 1770 (Frazier D) Tire recycling program: rubberized pavement.  
 Introduced: 2/22/2019  
 Status: 3/18/2019-Referred to Com. on NAT. RES.  
 Location: 3/18/2019-A. NAT. RES.  
 Calendar: 4/8/2019 2:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 447 ASSEMBLY NATURAL RESOURCES, FRIEDMAN, Chair  
 Summary: Would extend the operation of the Rubberized Pavement Market Development Act to June 30, 2024.
- AB 1797 (Smith D) State Department of Education: report: teacher induction.  
 Introduced: 2/22/2019  
 Last Amend: 3/25/2019  
 Status: 3/26/2019-Re-referred to Com. on ED.  
 Location: 3/21/2019-A. ED.  
 Calendar: 4/10/2019 1:30 p.m. - State Capitol, Room 4202 ASSEMBLY EDUCATION, O'DONNELL, Chair  
 Summary: Would require the State Department of Education to submit a report providing recommendations on teacher induction and teacher credentialing to the Legislature and Governor on or before December 31, 2020.

- SB 217 (Portantino D) Special education: individuals with exceptional needs: early education programs.  
 Introduced: 2/6/2019  
 Status: 3/18/2019-March 20 set for first hearing canceled at the request of author.  
 Location: 2/13/2019-S. ED.  
 Summary: Would require, for the 2019–20 school year and each school year thereafter, a school district or charter school to admit a child to a transitional kindergarten program who will have their 5th birthday after December 2 but during that same school year if the child is an individual with exceptional needs, subject to specified conditions.
- SB 390 (Umberg D) School districts / community college districts: school security officers / security guards.  
 Introduced: 2/20/2019 Last Amend: 3/25/2019  
 Status: 3/26/2019-Withdrawn from committee. Re-referred to Com. on ED.  
 Location: 3/26/2019-S. ED.  
 Calendar: 4/10/2019 9 a.m. - John L. Burton Hearing Room (4203) SENATE EDUCATION, LEYVA, Chair  
 Summary: Under current law, every school security officer employed by a school district or community college district, and every security guard working on the property of a school district or community college district pursuant to a contract with a private licensed security agency, who works more than 20 hours a week as a school security officer or security guard is required to complete a course of training developed by the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services of the Department of Consumer Affairs in consultation with the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. This bill would require those school security officers and security guards to complete training course regardless of number of hours worked per week.
- SB 396 (Morrell R) Public works: prevailing wage.  
 Introduced: 2/20/2019  
 Status: 2/28/2019-Referred to Com. on RLS.  
 Location: 2/20/2019-S. RLS.  
 Summary: Current law generally requires that workers employed on public works be paid not less than the general prevailing rate of per diem wages for work of a similar character in the locality in which the public work is performed, and not less than the general prevailing rate of per diem wages for holiday and overtime work, as prescribed. Current law requires the Director of Industrial Relations to determine the general prevailing rate of per diem wages for work of a similar character in the locality in which the public work is to be performed, and the general prevailing rate of per diem wages for holiday and overtime work, as specified. This bill would make technical, nonsubstantive changes to the provisions relating to the prevailing rate of per diem wages.
- SB 541 (Bates R) School safety: lockdown drills.  
 Introduced: 2/22/2019  
 Status: 3/8/2019-Set for hearing April 3.  
 Location: 3/7/2019-S. ED.  
 Calendar: 4/3/2019 9 a.m. - John L. Burton Hearing Room (4203) SENATE EDUCATION, LEYVA, Chair  
 Summary: Would require every public, charter, and private, as provided, school that provides educational services to pupils in kindergarten or in any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, to conduct a lockdown, as defined, drill, at least twice per school year. By expanding the duties of a public school, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.
- SB 614 (Rubio D) Early childhood education: county offices of education: grant program.  
 Introduced: 2/22/2019  
 Status: 3/14/2019-Referred to Coms. on ED. and HUMAN S.  
 Location: 3/14/2019-S. ED.  
 Summary: Would establish the Inclusive Early Childhood Education Grant Program for the purpose of increasing access to early childhood education programs. The bill would require the State Department of Education's Special Education Division and Early Learning and Care Division, in consultation and coordination with the State Department of Developmental Services, to administer the program, including developing criteria for proposals, selecting grantees, and collecting specified data. The bill would require an applicant to be a county office of education and to include specified information in its grant application.
